The Hotel, "The New House", was built in the latter part of the nineteenth century as the summer home of the Lords of the Manor. It replaced older buildings that had stood on the site since before modern records began, so highly prized was the location.

It stands in the market square of this unique island, adjacent to the ruins of Lindisfarne priory, the church of St Mary the Virgin and the Priory Museum, our garden abutting the priory itself.

The views from the front of the hotel, and the garden, over the harbour, to Lindisfarne Castle and, on the horizon, the Farne Islands are truly breathtaking. The profile of the castle silhouetted by the rising sun or reflecting the westering sun at dusk is a vision you are unlikely to forget.

The hotel is fully licensed, with a well stocked bar (at the last count we had over fifty different types of whisky and whiskey) and attractive dining room.

Our Hotel, bar and restaurant are open from mid February to December each year. Morning Coffee, Lunch, afternoon tea and dinner are served in the garden as well as the hotel. Children are most welcome for who special terms apply. While dogs are more than welcome in the garden, where a fresh supply of drinking water is always available, regrettably they are not allowed in the hotel. Disabled toilets are situated in the bar and access ramps are available for the use of wheelchair reliant visitors

Our bedrooms with the exception of our single are en-suite. The single has an in-room washbasin and a bathroom for the sole use of the single, just across the corridor. All are equipped with digital TV, hairdryer and tea & coffee making facilities. The rooms at the front of the hotel, all share the magnificent view of harbour and castle. All of the bedrooms are at upper floor levels, and as the hotel was originally built as a private residence we have no lift.

The island is ideal as a base for touring Northumberland and the Borders, being situated just a few miles from the A1 trunk road and just over an hours drive from both Newcastle and Edinburgh.

The island cut off as it is twice in every twenty four hours by the tide, is the perfect place to “get away from it all”; to enjoy lovely walks; discover unspoilt beaches; even face the occasional bracing wind!

The dunes and shoreline of the island, rich in flora and fauna, are under the stewardship of English Nature. Their brief, to maintain the environment, and preserve the special conditions that make the island so important to migrating birds, creates a magnet, attracting bird watchers from near and far.

Historically wealthy, the island offers the 16th century Lindisfarne Castle, the ruins of the 11th century Priory, the Church of St Mary the Virgin, with parts dating back to Saxon times, and built over the ruins of the original 7th century monastery, and St. Cuthbert’s island, a tiny outcrop in the channel between the island and the mainland where Cuthbert first contemplated the life of a hermit before moving to one of the Inner Farne islands.

On a more modern theme the Island’s Heritage Centre features a computerised version of the Lindisfarne Gospels “Turning the Pages”.
